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## Application Advice Corner



Are you an aspiring student athlete?  
Here are three tips to help start your journey:

**Start early** – We advise starting to research options 18 - 24 months prior to the date you plan to attend a U.S. university. Remember to plan and organize your prep calendar with standardized admissions test requirements in mind (e.g. SAT or ACT and English language proficiency tests like the TOEFL and IELTS)!

**Understand the three main U.S. collegiate sports organizations** – These include the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association), NAIA (National Association Intercollegiate Athletics) and the NJCAA (National Junior College Athletic Association). Of these three, the NCAA is the largest organization that governs intercollegiate athletics, and does so across three divisions: Division I and II consists of large public universities, with Division I sports being the most competitive, and Division III typically represents smaller private colleges. If you're setting your sights on a NCAA athletic scholarship, make sure to research their eligibility requirements.

**Build a strong online presence** – Normally, student-athletes are able to be noticed by college coaches via in-person camps and showcases, however, these can no longer occur due to the global coronavirus pandemic. Student-athletes have to work a lot harder to be noticed, then, and are limited to cultivating an online presence. This can include connecting with coaches via email, posting game film montages online and finding out about available recruitment services.
